## House Wines

*Dry or Med dry- ask for details*

*Large glass: £3.30    Half litre carafe: £7.95    Bottle: £11.40*

**Coddington English Wines**, from only 3 miles away, are quite dry and compare favourably with Loire wines. We strongly recommend them.

----- *Pinot Gris, A wine with the distinctive spicy bouquet of the Pinot grape. It is fairly dry and fruity with good balance.                      2009, £13.95*

----- *Ortega, A dry full bodied and well balanced wine.    2009, £14.95*  
*It has a light, floral bouquet and flavour suggestive of peaches and limes.*

**Chardonnay**, Unoaked, C J Pask, Hawkes Bay, 2009, £16.75  
*New Zealand. This is a rich unoaked chardonnay that shows great purity of flavour. Pineapple and peach flavours on the mid-palate softens its citrus character. The finish is crisp, clean and persistent.*

**Sauvignon Blanc**, Villa Maria, Marlborough, 2009 £16.90  
*New Zealand.    Very fresh elegant wine with glorious fruit flavours.*

**Chablis**, Les Armes de Chablis, France 2007, £ 18.50  
*This wine epitomises the fresh, steel, no wood approach to Chablis with its lovely pure mineral flavours and elegant fruity style.*

**Sancerre**, Andre Dezat et Fils. France 2007, £18.85  
*A fine quality Sancerre, full of fruit with complex smoky character.*

**Piesporter Michelsberg**, QbA, Moselland, Germany.2008, £13.95  
*Easy to drink, quite fresh and fruity with a delicious grape character, an off dry sweetness.*

## Half Bottles

*Gewurztraminer, Pfaffenheim, France, 2008, £9.90*  
*Fine, richly textured, spicy rose petal nose and firm, fruit filled palate.*

*Macon-Lugny, Les Genievres, Louis Latour 2009 – Half £8.90*  
*Comes from the heart of the Maconnais area. It is heavier than Chablis and other Burgundies from further north, yet has a crisp, creamy elegance.*

# **Red Wines**

**Pinotage**, Freedom Cross, Coastal Region, S.A. 2009, £14.75  
*This example of Pinotage – South Africa’s unique grape - is softly styled with intense blackberry fruit and mocha coffee notes.*

**Syrah**, Calicata, Mendoza, Argentina. 2008, £14.75  
*A full, meaty wine. Aromas of figs & dry plums combined with tobacco notes from the oak.*

**Shiraz**, Barrington Estate, S.E. Australia. 2009, £16.50  
*Rich, full bodied and fruity.*

**Costieres de Nimes**, Reserve Pierre, (Rhône Valley) 2007 £15.50  
*Classic French table wine.*

**Madiran**, Le Couvent, Chateau PEYROS. S.W. Fr. 2003 £21.50  
*Full-bodied and dry, yet with a lot of fruit lurking underneath the tannins, this wine is not for the faint-hearted - and can be enjoyed with hearty food.*

**Chianti Classico**, Le Cassiane, Italy. 2007. £17.50  
*Although young, this is a very traditional style of Chianti - red cherry, vibrant acidity and sweet spice.*

**Montagne-Saint-Emilion** Chateau Calon. 2001 £ 25.75  
*This claret is from a satellite of the famous right-bank village of St-Emilion, it has cedar and cigar box aromas and a lovely savoury aftertaste*

## **Half bottles**

*Chilean Casillero del Diablo, **Cabernet Sauvignon**, 2008, £8.90*

*Chateau Trocard, **Bordeaux** Superieur, Fr. 2006, £12.50  
Made by Jean-Louis Trocard near Lalande-de-Pomerol, this has all the pleasing Merlot fruit you associate with the Right Bank together with correct structure and excellent length of flavour.*
